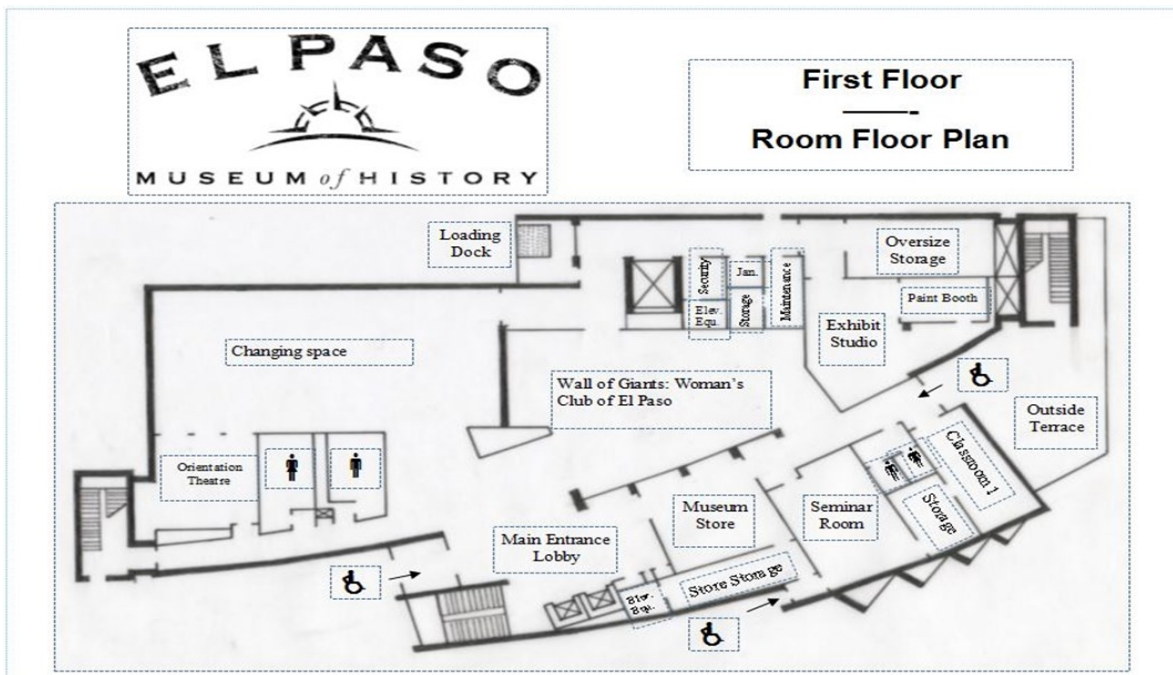

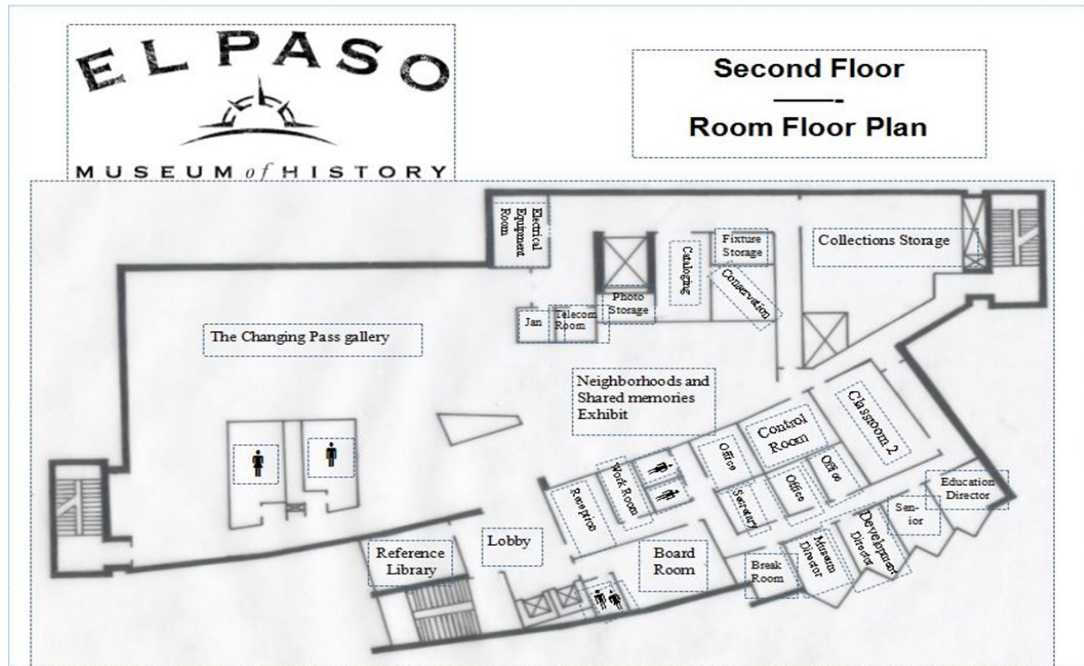

Library Auditorium	Keynote Address: <i>Colonization of the Lower Rio Grande, Setting up Towns and Ranchos, 1730s-1848</i> Armando C. Alonzo, Texas A&M University One key development in the 18th century was colonization of the Lower Rio Grande, a process that included awarding of land grants to settlers up to the 1840s. This is a very significant event because it gave the borderlands its Hispanic foundation, with the founding of towns and hundreds of ranches. The settlers way of life influenced their cultural and economic character in many dimensions.

This presentation will explore teaching methods that highlight this war's significance.

Alonzo, Texas A&M University The 150th anniversary of the long cattle drives from Texas to the North allows for a re-examination of the role of the cattlemen, drovers, and cowboys. While ranchers were the foundation of this industry, trail drovers and cowboys had a critical part in insuring that the cattle and horse herds reached the new markets. While it is a colorful story, it is also a legacy of a business enterprise that helped post-Civil War Texas rise economically.
